

A Centennial Moment

In celebrating Lions Clubs 100th anniversary, very few people are aware of the sequence of events that brought Lionism to NC. We were the 37th state to enter the Lions World. Melvin Jones' wife, who was a professional golfer, told him about this beautiful state after playing golf at Pinehurst. Later she would return to Pinehurst and win a major tournament there.

A short time after that on March 13,1922, the first NC Lions Club, Winston-Salem Lions Club, was formed. Six weeks later Melvin Jones, LCI founder, went to Winston Salem for their Charter Night. At that time Winston-Salem was the largest city in the Carolinas with a population of 50,000, due to the huge factories of Hanes Knitting and the RJ Reynolds empire.

This club was headed by Charles S. Lawrence and would meet at the Robert E. Lee Hotel for more than 50 years until the hotel was torn down. WS Lions grew to over 150 members.

This first club in NC was home club to eight District Governors and two Lions appointed as Directors of Lions International. Back in those days directors were appointed not elected.

Dr L. Byerly Holt was instrumental in forming the Eye Bank of NC in 1951. And, listen closely, Henry Foy Jr., an executive with Indera Mills in Winston-Salem was a customer of a young salesman named Jack Stickley, who at that time had just started his yarn distribution Company. Foy invited Stickley to the Winston-Salem Lions Club. One month later Jack Stickley became a Lion with the Charlotte Central Club . . .


