Dianne and I and our family will be taking a vacation in July. We actually made our reservations over a year ago.

And next year, we are traveling to Chicago for the International Lions Convention. As it is Lions Centennial year, plans began years ago. When families desire to take a trip, it is because they either enjoyed their last visit there or it is a destination that someone recommended as they had a good experience there. Vacationers are seeking a place of rest, yet with enjoyable activities.

Vacations are enjoyable because it is not just the being there, it is the preparation for the journey and the memories that are made.

I recently received a call from Susan King, Camp Dogwood Director, who shared with me that a firsttime camper, Marianne Snyder of Spruce Pine, had spoken to her about how much she was enjoying the camp. Marianne, visually impaired due to macular degeneration, expressed her pleasure in making jewelry, crafts, and the other daily activities of being a camper. She was making new friends and especially enjoyed rocking on the porch looking at the water.

Marianne began losing her sight after the birth of her daughter. Before long, she had to stop driving as her vision diminished. She continued to care for her family and even began to take care of her beloved fourth grade teacher whom she loved dearly. She never planned for a vacation because she was so busy helping others.

At the age of 64, Lions of Spruce Pine introduced her to Camp Dogwood. Yes, this was the first vacation Marianne had ever taken. As she sat on the porch, rocking and talking with her new friends, she was amazed at the amount of the water she could distinguish through the creeping cloudiness caused by her eye disease.

"This is the most water I have ever seen", she told me on our call after she returned home. "This was my first vacation and I had a ball!" she proudly exclaimed.

I made notes on my pad regarding her comments. First vacation, most water, and 'can't wait to go again'. She has now experienced what sighted people do all because of the Lions of North Carolina.

A thought entered my mind, "Marianne," I asked. "Have you ever seen the ocean?" I knew the answer but I waited for her reply.

"No, but I heard about a chance to go fishing at the beach with other VIPs". I filled her in on the VIP Fishing Tournament held each year at the Outer Banks. I heard the excitement grow in her voice when she shared a dream of hers.

"I've been told that there are lighthouses on the coast," she explained. I proceeded to tell her of my family vacations to visit every NC lighthouse. Trips planned on school breaks by my fourth grade teacherwife when our children were in elementary school and studying NC history. She continued, "I don't want to go up in a lighthouse, I just want to touch one."

I just want to touch one, I

have never had a vacation, I want to see the ocean; it all echoed in my mind as to how LIONS make a difference when we serve in our communities. I completed our call with a promise. "Let me see what the Lions can do to make your dream come true."



who can help us as Lions. Target businesses that might support Brighter Visions similar to what Talbots did in Winston-Salem: on one particular night for two hours, 10% of the profit went to Brighter Visions.

Feed the hungry: I challenge clubs throughout the district to have specific service projects to address hunger by possibly partnering with other Lions, civic groups, churches, or businesses to address hunger in our communities.

Increase membership in the district: evaluate trends in membership over the last five years and follow the step by step membership program outlined in the District Directory. Several directories are distributed to each club's officers. Build up existing clubs by having membership nights and target retirees, military, families, and spouses of members.

Finally, continue the International Literacy Program by encouraging your club to collect books for schools or public libraries, tutoring students and adults in reading, and read to students in school or public library settings.

I realize this is a lot to take on but with District I working together as we did last year, I know these goals will be met. Roar Lions Roar!
