We do have three new Leo clubs and a new club is

being worked on in Millers Creek.

Over all, I am proud of each club for what you have accomplished this year and the efforts you continue making in increasing membership.

We have mailed each club in the district a letter and two membership applications with the challenge to finish the year on June 30 with plus 2 or more new members from the total membership shown at Lions International as of April 1.

In addition to the club challenges, we have challenged the leadership team to seek and recruit an additional new member each above the club challenges.

Hopefully these challenges will be taken seriously and if so, your clubs and our district will start the year 2016-2017 with a stronger outlook for service. Service activities reported to Lions International show a reported 7790 hours of service to 50,249 people.

We have submitted an application to the Charlotte planning board for an entry in the Novant Thanksgiving Day Parade in November. We will be notified in July if we are accepted. We will need Lions to walk in the parade and we will also have the MSU (Mobile Screening Unit, Vision Van). Lions from across the state will be invited to join us in this endeavor.

Lions night at the Hickory Crawdads game will be June 16. It will be a fun-filled outing with an all-you-can-eat picnic buffet at the stadium. There will be hamburgers, hot dogs, BBQ, trimmings, drinks, and ice cream. Tickets to the game and picnic meal are \$18.00 per person and must be reserved in advance. Next year's leadership team is on the ball! The three club leadership training sessions have been scheduled as well as the first cabinet meeting and installation/awards banquet. Last month I said that I would tell you more about one of my goals that I am so excited about: the Reading Literacy Program, which actually started several years ago.

Lions in the US have an amazing opportunity to promote reading and impact the literacy of military children. As part of the Reading Action Program, Lions can support the USO and United Through Reading's Military Program by providing assistance to

the children of military families.

Separation from a parent is one of life's most stressful events for children, affecting their sense of security, their re-

lationships, and their ability to learn. As US troops are asked to leave again on their third, fourth and even fifth deployment, the USO recognizes the urgent need to help the family members who are left behind. For the children of wounded, ill, and injured troops, the stresses of getting good grades while coping with a parent in a military hospital can be even more challenging.

That's why the USO, along with its partner United Through Reading, offers troops stationed at forward operating bases in the United States and overseas the opportunity to read a story aloud to their child. Mom or Dad's special story time is recorded on camera, and the USO mails this priceless DVD and book home.

For young children, the book and DVD not only encourage reading but also help them remember what a parent looks like during a long deployment.

The USO recently celebrated its 250,000th recording for United Through Reading's Military Program.

Here are some ways your club can get involved to make a difference in the lives of military children:

Organize a Book Drive. Host a book drive to support United Through Reading's Military Program. Books collected for this program must come from a list provided of over 100 books. Only **new** books on that list are accepted for this program or any program that your club participates in.

Organize a Virtual Book Drive. Host an online book drive to provide personalized book and DVD packages to military children. Register your virtual book drive at http:www.teamuso.org/Lions. Ask each club member to make a contribution online or have club members register and email friends and family asking them to support the program.

Adopt Your Local USO Center's Children's Reading Area. Help your local USO Center provide new books, coloring books, and crayons for your local USO's children's reading library.

Of course, just collecting children's books for your own community would be a perfect way to support the Lions Reading Program.

State/District Dues Will Increase

North Carolina Lions State Convention was held in Raleigh April 22-24.

At the final general session, certified delegates voted to increase dues paid to the State Council from \$3.50/member to \$5.50/member. It was noted that this is the first increase since 1995. Local Lions Clubs will need to assess the increase and their local dues for members.

Approximately 350 attendees were registered with 232 voting delegates certified. District 31-I had 50 delegates present.

The Matthews' granddaughter Eliza Kate Bray welcomed her and President Yamada. The number of hits really doesn't tell who wins the game. Neither does the number of strikeouts. What matters is the score. In our situation what we need to keep in mind is how we change the hearts and lives of the people we serve. We don't need to count numbers. We need to count Barbara. We need to count Terry. We need to keep score with names and faces and not just numbers. That makes what we do personal and that is more satisfying than helping, say, 20 nameless people.
