Boone Area Lions Club recently had a program by Dr. Bill Herring, retired orthopedic surgeon, about his work with the indigent people of Chiapas, Mexico. These people are 47% of the population of the area and are very poor and badly treated. Dr. Bill takes groups of volunteers to Mexico three times a year to serve the medical needs of the people there. In 2006 ground was broken for a clinic that opened in 2012, after six years to build with a budget of more than the \$150,000.

Dr. Bill made special mention of the effect of receiving



reading glasses on patients and their being able to read.

The Boone Area Club donated \$100 worth of reading glasses for Dr. Bill to take to Chiapas when he left on September 19 for a two week mission.

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Lexington DownTown Golf Tournament Results

Rives & Associates LLP Certified Public Accounts won the 35th Annual Dave Conrad Memorial Lions Golf Tournament recently with an 18-under-par 53 at the Lexington Country Club. Members of the team were Leon Rives, Kellan Rives, Jerry Williams, and Justin Clement.

NewBridge Bank team of Phil Grande, Jonathan Johnson, Jed Orman, and Jimmy Eggers finished second with a 16-under-par 55.

The tournament-sponsoring Lexington DownTown Lions Club team, with a score of 59, won the Davidson County Lions Club Challenge for the third year in a row, sqeaking past the Welcome Lions Club by a single stroke.

A huge cat painting traditionally awarded to the team finishing last is again in the possession of Tom's 4-Wheel Drive.

Lexington Utilities team, which earned the cat picture last year, avoided the honor this year, in part by adding J.J. Fashimpaur, the city golf director and PGA head teaching professional, to its team to finish with a 9-under-par 62.

Seventeen teams competed in the Captain's Choice Tournament, co-sponsored by Breeden Insurance and R.H. Barringer Distributing.

Scott Rhodes was closest to the pin on No. 3; Taylor Myers on No. 11; Sandra Moore on No. 12; and Keith Waisner on No. 16. Zeke Brown hit the longest drive on No. 18.

Those five, with Walt Fucito substituting for Rhodes, qualified for an extra 170-yard shot onto No. 18's green at the end of the tournament for a chance at cash prizes from \$50,000 to \$1 million. No one succeeded in knocking the final shot into the hole.

Stan Lanier and two members of the Rives team also won prizes in a separate putting competition.

Skydive Jump-a-thon Benefits Transportation for Disabled Vets

On Wednesday, November 11, Veteran's Day, Skydive Carolina will partner with Veteran Transport Services (VTS) of Charlotte in a unique fundraiser. Supporters of VTS will skydive while raising money similar to walk-a-thon fundraiser. These can be tandem dives with an experienced skydiver. Experienced divers will receive a discounted dive rate of \$149 and \$5 will go to VTS.

VTS, a duly organized 501(c)(3) nonprofit, was established for the sole purpose of providing transportation to blind and disabled veterans with a mission of providing viable and reliable transportation for disabled veterans within the Mecklenburg County area. The goal is to get them to rejoin society and to become fully engaged in activities. With adequate transportation they will no longer be locked in their homes as though they were prisoners of war here at home.
