At all the clubs meetings and zone meetings I have attended, I am amazed at the ideas that have been discussed. These clubs and zones are doing a magnificent block of work. I am so proud to serve as your District Governor for a truly Ideal District!

Just a few reminders. Secretaries, don't forget to send your membership report to MyLCI each month and Zone Chairs please remember to fill out a report for each zone meeting that you hold.

Also, secretaries, it is of the utmost importance that you turn in your service activities at the same time you do your membership report. Turn in all activities and I'm sure that one of the categories listed on MyLCI will fit your activities. Especially remember to turn in those activities that count for the Centennial Service Challenge: youth, hunger, environment, and vision. There are special awards for these activities.

Finally, your club should be thinking about a Legacy Project to be completed by June 30, 2018. If you need assistance with any of the above, please don't hesitate to contact me.

I have spoken about this many times, but let's review -- What is the Centennial Service Challenge? The CSC is an initiative to celebrate Lions' 100 years of service through a service itself. Clubs are challenged to organize at least one service project in each of the four CSC Campaigns per year. The campaigns include Engaging Our Youth, Sharing the Vision, Relieving the Hunger, and Protecting Our Environment.

The overall goal is to serve more

than 100 million people by June 30, 2018, at least 25 million people in each of the CSC Campaigns.

What are the Worldwide Weeks of Service? While clubs are encouraged to implement CSC Campaign projects throughout the year, the WWS are special weeks when clubs all over the world are asked to focus their efforts on addressing certain local issues to maximize our global service impact. The following dates and themes have been identified for the special WWS:

August 8 - 14 WWS for Youth October 10 - 16 WWS in Sight January 9 - 15 WWS to Fight Hunger April 17 - 23 WWS to Protect Our Planet

Please mark these dates so that your club can participate in this very important Centennial Service Challenge. While I realize that the August dates have already passed, it's never too late to have a Week for Youth. If you don't particularly care about awards, then I hope your club will still participate since we all care about service. That's what we do! We Serve!

Two more reminders. Our VIP Fishing Tournament is coming up soon -- October 17-19 at the Outer Banks. Volunteers need to be at the Manteo Park on Sunday, October 16 by noon. Volunteers who can are asked to stay on Thursday, October (Cont.DG Page 6)

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On the Prowl -- With 1st Vice Governor George

Recently, the District Governor's Team visited the North Charlotte Lions Club. This club, as many of you know, is mainly made up of Visual Impaired Persons who are employed by Lions Services. Their first meeting of the month is held at Lion Services, where they bring their bag lunch during their half-hour lunch break.

Have you noticed how your club members get somewhat restless if the meeting runs too long? Consider that this group is still off-the-clock after 30 minutes of the meeting and are not being paid. Lion President Rufus Crawford does a phenomenal job of staying on task. He has an agenda and keeps the meeting moving. Reports are brief and the members are attentive.

At the DG Team visit last month, the team furnished lunch and made a concentrated effort to keep the meeting to less than one hour. Imagine, keeping a District Governor's Official visit with a meal to less than one hour!

I must admit, the team met earlier and discussed how we would approach this meeting. The uniqueness of a VIP club offers new challenges to the message we attempt to deliver when we visit your clubs. VIP clubs have great difficulties in fundraising. Coupled with transportation issues, general public fundraising is near impossible. Administrative funds are difficult as well as attempting to meet District goals.

However, more importantly to what we do as Lions is service to others. These Lions strive to make a difference in their community. This week they are collecting back-to-school supplies. Food drives are common throughout the year, as well as volunteering in the Free Eye Clinic. When they see a need, they try their best to serve. Perhaps the most touching service they relayed to us is an attempt to help homeless children.

A Child's Place (their webpage is http://www.achildsplace.org/)

has a mission of working to erase the impact of homelessness on children and their education. North Charlotte Lions have been helping by providing meals to these children, much like the backpack programs many clubs participate in.

Now, stop for a minute and think of your normal meal. Got it? Now, in your mind, pack a bag lunch. If you are like me, Id pack a couple of sandwiches: lunch meat or ham and cheese, some chips, perhaps a fresh peeled cucumber, a candy bar, and a piece of fruit. Along with that, I'd purchase a coffee or soft drink at the office.

For these homeless children, perhaps the only meal they will get consists of the following:

- -- Bottle of water
- -- Grain Bar (as in Granola)
- -- Fruit cup

Lion Rufus and the North Charlotte Lions Club have a greater concern. When school is out, this may be the <u>only</u> meal these children will receive.

Let's face it, Fellow Lions, there are needs in your neighborhood as well. Service is our mantra -- it is what we do best. Why not consider a service project for each month and see where you too can make a difference.

At our meeting, we challenged Zone 10 and 11 to discuss how they can help this club in their service projects. I'm going to ask my club to collect water, grain bars, and fruit cups. Service is what we do best as Lions.

VIPs Competing in Rio Paralympics

U.S. Paralympic athletes are riding on the success of their Olympic counterparts who topped the medal count with 121 total medals. Among the 267 athletes named to the U.S. Paralympic Team are 38 athletes who will be competing in visual impairment categories, seven of whom are guides. These 38 athletes will compete in six different sports: goalball, judo, rowing, swimming, track & field, and for the first time ever, paratriathlon.

Many athletes on this list, returning Paralympians and first-timers, got their start with U.S. Association of Blind Athletes or came through a USABA program.

"We are proud of each one of the 267 American athletes who will be competing for Team USA," said Mark Lucas, USABA's Executive Director. "But we're especially proud of the athletes we've supported along their Paralympic journey."

A Centennial Moment -Continues

Last month we reviewed Winston-Salem's place as the first club formed in North Carolina. The NC Lions story continues as we highlight the first twelve clubs in the state.

And, who would have guessed the second NC club organized would be located in a small town of less than 5000 hardy souls at that time -- Albemarle. This 25-member club would grow to 105 members in the 1950's and produce three District Governors.

Club number three, Raleigh Host, becomes seven times larger than the average club membership in NC. Raleigh Host elected eleven District Governors and is home club to six more plus one International Director, Dr. Lacy Presnell, Jr. This Lions Clinic has in the past 31 years evaluated and trained over 7000 people. The Raleigh Host Lions history also includes being graced by a visit from possibly the second most important person in our Lions movement, Miss Helen Keller.

Just three days after the Raleigh Host club was organized, Lions International officials organized club number four -- Wilmington. The focal point for humanitarian aid in coastal North Carolina, Wilmington is the home of five District Governors and one International Director, Lion Wallace I. West. The club is known for constructing a fragrance garden for the blind, complete with an accessible bridge to this area. Their unusual project was selling loaves of bread, given to them by a bakery and then sold on the street corners in Wilmington.

Club number five, Fayetteville, after first chartering was forced to disband in 1925 but came roaring back five years later. Fayetteville Lions ballooned to over 100 members during the 1950's. Probably this club's most significant accomplishment was the construction of the Lions Civic Center. Over the years the club presented seven District Governors.

Durham as club number six chose as its charter president, the town's mayor. The first club vice president was an upcoming politician by the name of William S. Umstead, who later became the Governor of NC. Home club of nine District Governors, these active Lions built the Durham Industries of the Blind, a boy scout hut near Duke University, and gave moral and financial support to the NC Rehabilitation Center for the Blind, which is located in Butner. PDG Vic Ashbaugh from the Durham club was possibly the most influential person involved with our organizing of the NC Association for the Blind back in 1934.

More next month as our history continues!

31-I Lions Kick Off Brighter Visions in Style

Lions of District 31-I kicked off the Brighter Visions fund with over \$40,000 in contributions, an historical initial donation. A capacity crowd met at Mayflower Seafood in Rural Hall to celebrate a successful 2015-2016 fundraising year and start 2016-2017 off with a bang.

The total is almost 20% of our BV goal for the year, a percentage reached by all five districts. HOWEVER the 31-I goal is nearly \$70,000 more than any other district.

At the Kick Off, District Brighter Visions chair Jimmy Myers personally donated \$100 as did State BV chair Jana Peedin. Collection jars on the tables, Tail Twister tickets, and other miscellaneous donations totaled over \$580. Club donations are listed below.

In addition district Camp Dogwood ticket Chair Theresa Munyon provided two gift baskets that she raffled that night using Camp Dogwood tickets. She sold 21 books of tickets.


