



On the Prowl

Several weeks ago, Dianne and I were working a broom sale at our local Farmers Market. A vendor nearby was selling birdhouses and my eyes kept wandering toward a unique, rather "church" looking, house with a glass door knob for the perch. The knob reminded me of the small house that I lived in as a child where each interior door was opened and closed by the classy glass knobs.

We purchased the bird house and as I began to install it on a post, I was warned by a bluebird of unhappiness that the old house was currently occupied. I elected then to postpone the task to sometime after the bluebirds moved out in search of happi-



ness. I then set the house on a table on the deck with intentions of puttingt it in the garage after I completed my yard work.

The next day, yes I forgot to put the house in the garage, I approached the birdhouse and saw traces of pine needles under the glass door knob perch. I soon found that a wren was busy building his nest and I certainly did not want to disturb him.

Yes, **HE** was building a nest as the male wren sometimes builds several nests in hopes that his mate will decide to move in and start a family. Apparently, she found the house and nest to be accommodating and we began to see their activity from our den.

This week, we noticed the male (Herbert, yes we named them) and Helen staying close to their new home as we awaited the birth of our grandbabybirds.

We assumed that Helen was taking food to the babies when we discovered that it was Herbert!

I researched the wren and found that the female will leave the eggs from time to time to feed. Sometimes it may look like the male is bringing food to the female. More likely though, he is anticipating (practicing) the feeding of the young, although occasionally feedings to the female may occur. I really wanted to believe that he was actually bringing Helen food while she sat on the eggs awaiting the birth of her babies.

Watching the birds became a religious moment for me as I thought of how nature works to continue the species. Birds find homes, they build nests, they find mates, and they nurture each other and their offspring with food and companionship.

Are the Herbert and Helens in your community being served? Is their home safe and dry? Are they being fed? Is Helen sitting on her eggs dependent on your club to help them? Are they waiting for a ride to the doctor, Camp Dogwood, or the Fishing Tournament?

June marks the end of Lions year 2015 - 2016. As we celebrate what we have done this year, let's be mindful of what we did not do. What opportunities did we miss? How could we have done more?

Working together in our community as in nature, requires teamwork and compassion. Lions since 1917 have sought to provide needs to their community.

Birds do it, let's do it.
