Recruitment

We normally do a pretty good job of bringing in New Members, but it has been apparent that we are not retaining them. A Past International President made the statement that we must bring in QUALITY MEMBERS! Fellow Lions, I personally feel that EVERY NEW MEMBER is a quality member with potential.

However, it is our responsibility to see that he/she remains a Quality Member. The sponsoring Lions take an oath to be mentors and see that the new members are well indoctrinated about LIONS and to assist them in gaining knowledge about our local, district, and state organization and Lions Clubs International and the many services and projects each provide. They will become and remain QUALITY MEMBERS!

Retention

We must do a much better job in our initial induction of a new member. We must make the induction ceremony impressive, one which they will remember and be proud that they became a Lion. All too often, we hand them a Membership Kit, etc., and say now you are a Lion! A proper and informative orientation program should follow relating to every level of Lionism. Also, if the member begins to falter or miss meetings, the sponsor should make contact to see what is happening and offer assistance.

Retention is the responsibility of every Lion and communication is most important.

Returnees

Every year clubs have a large number of "Drop Outs". WHY?

Have a Membership Growth Dinner. Have the club secretary look back over the past several years and review names of past Lions. Their reasons for dropping out may have changed.

Past Presidents can burn out & drop out. Extend an invitation to these past Lion Members to attend your Special Dinner, such as a Past Presidents Dinner to honor their service.



Entrance/Charter Fee Waived for US Veterans

Lions International has announced the extension of the *Involve a U.S. Veteran* pilot program through **June 30, 2016**. This program waives the charter or entrance fee for U.S. Veterans joining a Lions Club in the United States.

Eligible veterans include retired U.S. military personnel or honorably-discharged members of the Air Force, Army, Coast Guard Services, Marines, National Guard, Navy, or Reserves. Those currently serving in the National Guard or Reserves are also eligible. Lions Clubs International will provide an entrance fee waiver of \$25 (\$30 for charter members) to qualified U.S. veterans who join a local Lions club.

Veterans have made so many great contributions and sacrificed so much to serve our country. As service members return home from serving in the military, let's offer them an opportunity to get involved in their communities.

Together for over 75 Years

Leader Dogs for the Blind would not exist today if not for Lions Clubs International. Beginning with the support of one club, Leader Dog is now supported by Lions Clubs from all over the world.

It all began in 1938, when Charles A. Nutting, Donald P. Schurr, and S.A. Dodge led the Uptown Lions Club of Detroit in establishing a school to train guide dogs for people who are blind. Their motivation was Dr. Glenn Wheeler, a fellow Uptown Lion whose attempts to be accepted by another guide dog organization proved unsuccessful. The first clients were housed at the Park Avenue Hotel in Detroit and graduated in the fall of 1938.

Three Detroit Lions Clubs held a contest among all Lions Clubs for a new name for their venture. Over 500 names were submitted from around the world. The winning name "Lions Leader" was submitted by the Lions Club of Coulterville, Illinois. On April 4, 1939, Lions Leader Dog Foundation was incorporated as a Michigan nonprofit. Soon after incorporation, the Lions International Board of Directors requested that the word "Lions" be removed from the name because they had not sanctioned official support of the organization. So on June 15, 1940, the new name "Leader Dog League for the Blind" became official.

The remainder of the 1940s saw additional growth of the organization and increased involvement of local and nationwide Lions Clubs. Support came in the form of donations, identifying potential clients and spreading the word of Leader Dog's work and mission.

Melvin Jones, founder of Lionism, gave Leader Dog his personal endorsement in 1958. On May 10, 1968, Leader Dog received permission to use the Lions emblem by Lions International, formalizing the deep connection between the two

Lions Clubs throughout the world continue to support Leader Dog and its clients financially, bringing thousands of

people in need of assistance through Leader Dog's doors and serving on the Leader Dog Board of Trustees.

Through the leadership of Lion Antha Reid of North Wilkesboro Lions (formerly 31-B), over \$4,000 has been donated to Leader Dog through her campaign for Lions to collect and recycle aluminum can tabs.

As the current Leader Dog District Chair, I will work to support this program and ask that each of you as Lions continue your support also. To this day, the mission of the Lions, "We Serve," perfectly complements the Leader Dog mission of empowering people who are blind or visually impaired with lifelong skills for independent travel. I will be contacting Zone and Region Chairs to schedule visits to each of the Zone and Region meetings to share current information about this amazing program.




