Great Turnout and club representation at our third cabinet meeting on January 30 at Camp Dogwood.

Again I remain amazed at all that is being accomplished by the Lions of District 31-I. The District Leadership Team, club officers, and the club members are to be commended for their dedication and service to our those in our communi-

ties. Truly we could not have a better theme for our district than "31-I Lions are Hands On."

2016 Has Tremendous Opportunities for our District so far with activities reported to LCI By Local Clubs There have been 6453 hours of volunteer service and 35,134 people served.
Unfortunately in membership we have lost 16 Lions due to death and and 20 others dropped since July.

Clubs have done well adding 55 new members: 30 of our 61 clubs have a special opportunity to increase their community service and insure the future strength and viability of their club. These 30 clubs each have fewer than 20 members. Take that opportunity by evaluating your club and community and reaching out to those willing to serve in Lionism who have never been asked. Please consider a membership initiative to bring your numbers up to a 20 member minimum.

Our other 31 clubs have the same opportunity for growth by accepting the district challenge to have a positive growth of plus two members by July 1.

To address increasing our service to others, the district is looking for areas to establish new clubs. We have identified possible areas for growth in Pilot Mountain, Downtown Statesville, Catawba, Lenoir, Millers Creek, Wilkesboro, Jonesboro, Clemmons, and a rebuilding effort in Cornelius/Lake Norman.

March 5 we have planned a Guiding Lions Training for our district. We ask your participation. We need Guiding Lions in every county in our District. Even if you are unable to fulfill the obligations of a Guiding Lion, the course is educational and will enlighten you on the process to establish and operate new clubs. Incoming club and district leadership is urged to attend.

At the completion of this training, we will be establish a team to build new club/clubs to make our District stronger and more viable for service. These programs are a District initiative and your participation is solicited.

Time flies and although it is a little early, it is time to begin to identify your club officers for next year. District Governor-Elect Butch is already working on the directory for 2016-2017 and this information is obtained from the LCI website.

Check the current directory to make sure your club contact information and meeting place and time are correct. Club secretaries should go to MyLCI and check club listing to make sure all your information on meeting time and place is current. Also update individual member information to include emails, phone numbers, and mailing addresses.

Submit your new officers to LCI as soon as possible with copies to PDG Ron Staley, who will be doing the directory.

Be sure your clubs presidents and secretaries are familiar with the application and requirements for Club President Award and 100% Secretary Award.

District 31-O Convention was postponed to Feb. 26 & 27 and Leo Convention is this month. State Convention is in Raleigh in April; see forms on Page 8 & 9. With a Candidate for INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR, voting delegates from your club are important at state convention. Election and cabinet meeting is on Sunday of the convention.

Consider bringing a new Lion or prospective Lion to our state convention or new leadership in your club to participate in the educational opportunity, camaraderie, and fun of NC Lions.

Planning for our second 31-I Fall Convention in November has begun, lead by 2nd VDG George. You are invited to join in on the monthly planning sessions. The next one is at 7 pm on Feb. 29 at the Golden Corral at Hanes Mall. (cont. Page 6)

From DG-Elect Butch --

Greetings Fellow Lions of the "Ideal" District

How great it is to be a Lion, especially one in District 31-I! As Lion Elizabeth and I have traveled around the district, I see Lions at work: caring for their VIPs, providing service projects, and basically getting involved in the community. Keep up the great service!

I have noticed that not many clubs are turning in service projects on the LCI Service Project Activity sheet each month. Remember, we don't have a district point sheet to record activities, so the only report DG Allen will be able to refer to at the end of the Lions year is the Service Activity sheet on LCI in order to determine what individuals and/or clubs get specific awards for the year. So, get those service activities sent to LCI.

Secretaries, you can report at any time each month. It doesn't have to be turned in with the membership report, but it's probably better to do it then as a reminder to get it in!

This month I want to expand on the Centennial Service project – the plan to serve 100 million people by June, 2018. I am proud to announce that worldwide, Lions have already served 68 million. That's great, but we must carry on and see how far we can go in service before the deadline in 2018.

I'd like to discuss Centennial Community Legacy
Projects, which, of course, are part of the Centennial Service
Challenge, approaching it from a different perspective.

Connect with your community and build your Lion

legacy by planning a Centennial Community Legacy Project during our Centennial Celebration. Legacy Projects are visible gifts to your community that commemorate our Centennial and create a lasting legacy of your service contributions.

Your Legacy Project will serve as a reminder of just how important your club is to the community during the Centennial and beyond. Legacy Projects should be completed by June 30, 2018, so start planning yours today!

Let me be more specific! With three levels of participation, there's an opportunity for every club to get involved. Choose a project from the list below or develop your own to address specific needs in your community.

- (1) Raise Your Community Visibility: Post new Lions signs, donate a park bench, dedicate a statue.
- (2) Provide a Community Gift: Refurbish a park or playground, build a footbridge over a busy road, fund resources for the visually impaired, or donate a vehicle to a community organization.
- (3) Make a Community Impact: Build a clinic, expand a library or school, develop a training center, equip an area hospital.

Some of these projects are very broad but you can come up with your own Legacy Project – something as simple as putting up a Lions Club sign in your community.

There's more! Highlight your Legacy Project by hosting a dedication or ribbon-cutting ceremony and invite your community and local media to attend.

Share project photos on social media or ask your community to share photos from the site of your Legacy Project. Use the hashtag #Lions100 so we can share your project on the LCI Facebook page.

Finally, send out a press release or ask a local reporter to help tell your story.


Be sure to report your Legacy Project using the MyLCI Service Activity Report, under the Community and Culture activity classification. Clubs can earn a special banner patch, and select projects will be featured on the LCI website, social media, and LION Magazine.

A Legacy of Service

We are Lions! We Serve! But who are the Lions of the future? I know who they should be -- Legacy Lions!

What are Legacy Lions? You may be one. If not, you probably know one. I define Legacy Lions as second or third generation Lions who are following in, and sometimes expanding, their parent Lion's legacy of service.


In the past month, I have attended the funerals of two great Lions. Who will carry on their legacies? On the wall of my club's den are pictures of our club's deceased Lions. Who will carry on their legacies? The natural answer is, "Their adult children!"

In the same vein, who should carry on your legacy of service? Again, your adult children. We Lions love our clubs. We're dedicated to service to our communities. But we will not be able to carry the load forever. It is our duty to recruit our replacements. And the best people to recruit, the people who should care the most about continuing our legacy of service are our own children. Yes, you've asked them before, but how recently and how forcefully have you really ASKED them?

I have a plan, and it's two-fold, for reviving our Lions Clubs, and it revolves around potential Legacy Lions.

FIRST: We need to target the children of our deceased members who still live in our communities. Start with the deceased charter members's children. Plan a "Charter Members Memorial Night," on your club's charter anniversary, and invite the children of those members and their families. (Also include children of deceased members who were not charter members.) At this meeting, share the history of the club. Ceremoniously announce the names of the charter (or deceased) members. Share the club's contributions to the community. Then tell the prospective Legacy Lions who have come to honor their parents' accomplishments that you hope they will further honor their parents, assure that their legacies are not lost, and assure that service to the community which meant so much to them continues by joining the club that their parents helped to found. Have applications ready. You may need some then and there. But also assign a Lion to get back in touch with the potential Legacy Lions who do not join immediately, to let them know how much you want them to be a part of your club.

SECOND: We need to target the adult children of our current members. One way to approach this is with an Awards Night and invite all of your members' adult children in the community. Be sure to recognize and extol the virtues of all of your club's members at this meeting, either with individual awards or as parts of groups being recognized.



Legacy Lions

As you did at the Charter Member Memorial, finish with sharing club history and accomplishments, tell the potential Legacy Lions why they are there, and ask them, in order to assure that their parents' legacies continue, to join the club that meant so much to their parents' com-

munity.

Another option is to simply have your Lions bring their progeny to a meeting. Have your members primed, upon being introduced to prospective Legacy Lions, to tell them how much their parents mean to your club. Let the potential Lions know how much you'd like to see them working side-by-side with their parents. Tell all prospective Legacy Lions that you hope they will join. Make them feel that they are already part of your club.

But what if your grown children live out of your community or even out of the state? It doesn't matter. We can find a club for them. Search the internet, or ask your district governor or district GMT or GLT coordinator to find a club and a mentoring Lion in the area in question. Then arrange for an introduction to the mentoring Lion and an invitation to a club meeting (or even better, a service project). The greatest thing about this is that while we are getting our "kids" on board and helping a club in another community or state, Lions in other communities will be helping ours as we bring their members' progeny into our clubs. It doesn't really matter which club your offspring join, but that they join. You'll know, and they will acknowledge that when they are joining, they are doing so to honor you. They will know, and they will tell others, where they started - where YOU started them.

If our organization is to remain the force for good that it is, we must continue to grow. If we can put this plan into action, if we can make Lionism like a family heirloom that is passed down and received gratefully by our children, then we can assure the future of our clubs and our organization. Insure your legacy! Help to assure the legacy of your friends in Lionism who have passed. Encourage potential Legacy Lions to join your clubs!


JUST ASK!
