**Tend and Befriend** – January is **Taste and See** month. We begin the first of our new calendar year and the last half of our Lions year. It is a time to taste the successes and see what is in our future. How will your club plan, adjust and make the remainder of this year successful?

The front-page copy of our December District Newsletter lays proudly on a cabinet next to my desk. The headline: **RISE AGAINST HUNGER** congratulates us for our recent activity and challenges us for continued emphasis toward future efforts. It is with great pleasure that we announce the destination of the Rise Against Hunger meals you helped package on 11/5/2017. A shipping container, holding 270,864 meals, has been sent to Nicaragua for our partner ORPHANetwork, an organization that nourishes lives through food assistance and other services in Nicaragua.



The joy of the season is enhanced by your efforts and knowing that many children are receiving nourishment that may not have been possible otherwise.


#### THE PAST AND PRESENT-CAMP DOGWOOD-THE FACTS

In 1959, The North Carolina Association of Workers for the Blind appointed a committee known as the Committee to Consider the General Welfare of the Blind of North Carolina. Three Lions served on this committee: they were William Joyce, Ben Eason and Coleman C. Cates, Jr. In 1960 this committee reported that one of the major unmet needs of the visually challenged was recreation. The committee recommended the appointment of the Camp Committee for the purpose of studying the feasibility of establishing and organizing a program for financial support of such a facility in North Carolina. Statistical data shows more than 10,000 visually handicapped in the state at that time and 13,868 Lions.

In 1964, the Articles of Incorporation were executed naming the new Corporation CAMP DOGWOOD, INC. and setting out these purposes: "To organize, create and establish a recreational camp or camps for the use, enjoyment, training, adjustment, benefit of visually handicapped persons; to build, maintain, equip, operate and develop such recreational facilities as may be useful, beneficial, convenient and/or necessary to enable the visually handicapped persons to visit and occupy such camp facilities for recreational and educational purposes; to sponsor training schools or courses or workshops in connections with any of the forgoing recreational activities; to receive gifts and contributions, and generally to do any act necessary or appropriate for encouraging, aiding and training any person skilled in or giving promise of becoming skilled in any of the recreational activities above referred to."

In 1965 at the State Convention of Lions the following resolution was adopted: "Whereas, the welfare of the blind has been a major objective of North Carolina Lions for more than 40 years, and Whereas, the delegates to this convention verily believe that recreation will further enrich the lives of our visually handicapped people and promote their general welfare; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: 1. That the delegates to this convention duly convened in Fayetteville on June 8, 1965, hereby approve and adopt Camp Dogwood, Inc. a recreational facility for the blind people of North Carolina, as a proper and worthy project of North Carolina Lions. 2. That this convention hereby recommends to the Lions of North Carolina that they give Camp Dogwood, Inc., their moral and financial support to the end that this facility may fill an additional unmet need of the blind citizens of this State. Duly adopted this 8th day of June, 1965."

We come to 2018. There are now 6,300 +/- Lions in North Carolina and 233,432 (2016 census) blind and disabled. Of that number, 47,170 of the visually challenged reside in Dis-

#### Veterans Administration Volunteer Services

Have you ever wondered what VAVS means? A small portion of your district dues goes to support the VA Hospital in Salisbury

which serves veterans in our area. Clubs volunteer once a month to host a bingo night for those at the hospital.

Our VAVS chairs are Cleo Zemke (<u>cleoz1990@yahoo.com</u>) and Linda VanVleet (<u>busybee2@twc.com</u>) from the Gold Hill Lions Club. One or both of them and PDG Morris VanVleet are usually on hand to help so newcomers should not be apprehensive about volunteering.

What does this involve you might ask. Lions arrive at Building 6 at the hospital between 6:30 and 6:45 to get ready for the 7 p.m. start time. Parking should be available near the building. They bring the fixings for a light meal, all store-bought (nothing homemade), and prepare to feed 35-40 veterans. Paper products are furnished by the hospital. Suggestions are a sandwich such as meat and cheese, chicken salad, pimento cheese with chips and a pickle. Cookies or cake make a simple dessert. Drinks should be all the same thing so that it can be poured together into a cooler or canned drinks.

Also bring \$75-100 for bingo prizes. Silver or gold dollars are great. Rules are that participants may play two cards. If they get a win on one card, they have to turn that card over and not play it again until the cards are cleared, usually after about 5 wins. The clubs can decide how they want to run the game. Winners usually get \$1, possibly \$2. It is suggested that you set aside \$10 for the last coverall game so when you get down to less than say \$5, you will want to call last game, keeping in mind that you can have multiple winners on one call, especially if you haven't cleared the cards.

The folks really enjoy coming out to the social room for the food and fellowship. A few don't like bingo, but come anyway. It's the least we can do to thank them for their service.

Don't forget to sign in on the form. Save all your receipts for which you are requesting reimbursement, which is up to \$150, paid to your club treasurer by the district. If you can get donations for food items, you will have more money for prizes.

Note: Some of the clubs meet at a local restaurant after bingo to enjoy dinner out.

If your club is already participating in this project, that's great. If you would like to do this in the future, check with one of the clubs on the schedule and see if you can partner with them or contact the VAVS chairs. I bet they won't turn you down. It is such a blessing to give back in this way.

### Mocksville Lions Club Makes Donations for Disaster Relief



The Mocksville Lions Club recently made several monetary donations to be used for Disaster Relief and other humanitarian causes. As part of the largest service-oriented organization in the world, Lions Clubs International, the Mocksville Lions Club is making donations to help with disasters here in the United States and abroad. \$1,000 was given to the Lions Clubs International Foundation to assist in providing relief to needy individuals as a result of the many recent disasters that have occurred both here in the United States and abroad. In August the Lions Club International Foundation awarded a \$100,000.Major Catastrophe Grant to victims of Hurricane Harvey throughout the Texas and Louisiana areas. \$100,000 was also awarded by the Foundation to assist victims of Hurricane Irma throughout Florida and the Southeast U.S.

and Mexico. An additional \$100,000 was awarded to the U.S. Territory of Puerto Rico in the wake of Hurricane Maria. Lions across the world have always risen to help not only those that are visually impaired, but also those who are suffering other hardships as well.

Our local Mocksville Lions Club also donated \$250 to Doctors without Borders which is a world famous organization that provides a host of medical and visual services to needy individuals in impoverished nations across the globe.

The Mocksville Lions Club donated an additional \$250 to The Carter Center. The Carter Center is a non-profit organization dedicated to the eradication of the blindness disease called "Onchocerciasis" or more commonly referred to as "River Blindness". River Blindness is a preventable disease caused by drinking contaminated water often from unclean rivers and other sources of unsafe water. It is most prevalent in developing nations throughout the world. The Lions Club International Foundation has donated over \$45,000,000 to help prevent blindness from this preventable type of blindness through the use of a vaccine.

The Mocksville Lions Club is hereby issuing a challenge to all local civic organizations and/or individuals to match our contributions. The Mocksville Lions Club is also challenging all other NC District 31-I Lion Clubs to match our contributions to these worthy causes. ## More Club News and Events

#### Pilot Lions Engage in LCI's Reading Action Program

**Pilot Lions Club** is concerned about the welfare of the children at Pilot Elementary School which stands right next to the club house. Half of the 3<sup>rd</sup> graders at Pilot Elementary are not reading proficient and nearly 60% of the student body faces economic hardship. Also, 5 year-olds are coming to kindergarten without basic skills such as knowing letters and shapes that will help them succeed. Pilot Lions Club is partnering with The Duke Endowment, Fairview United Methodist Church, and Reading Is Fundamental (RIF) to change the trajectory of a child's life from failure to success through a Reading Action Program inspired by Lion Clubs International (LCI).

On Monday, November 12, The Pilot Lions Club hosted 15 teachers and administrators from Pilot Elementary School for a dinner and a presentation by Dr. Judy Cheatham, Provost at Martin Methodist College and former Vice President of "Reading Is Fundamental." Pilot Lions' President Sandy Miller welcomed our special guests including Principal Stephanie Hall, Rev. Kristen Richardson-Frick of The Duke Endowment, and representatives from the Hamilton Lakes Lions Club in Greensboro. Lion Tim Jordan catered a delicious meal for the teachers who appreciated the home-cooking and hospitality.



Dr. Judy Cheatham did extensive work with Lions Club International while she was with RIF. She provided the literacy data which is contained in the 2013 Literacy Summit Booklet. She considers herself a missionary promoting childhood literacy in her capacity as an English Professor, first at Eastern Kentucky Univ., then Greensboro College, then RIF, and now at Martin Methodist College. She has developed strategies that improve a child's ability to read and develop a love of reading by giving them opportunity to choose high quality children's books.

Did you know that ability to read by the third grade is a determining factor in one's success in school, career, and life? Did you know that children can lose up to three months of literacy if not engaged in summer enrichment activities? Did you know that socio-economic status is a key indicator on how well a child does in school?

Dr. Cheatham proposed that RIF's Read for Success program reverses the "summer slide," and gives the children opportunities to GAIN, not lose, reading proficiency over the summer. After doing research on 33,000 children in over 173 communities, most of them rural, RIF found that 57% of the children gained reading levels after taking home quality children's books, receiving effective instruction from teachers, and their parents engaging in at-home reading strategies. After she left RIF, she took her research and passion to Giles County, TN where she implemented a summer reading camp for at-risk children where the children exceled in reading proficiency. Moreover, Martin Methodist College, civic groups, churches, and local government came together and supported these children and their families.

Now, the Pilot Lions Club is partnering with a local church to provide a similar experience so the children at Pilot can excel. The Duke Endowment has challenged Fairview United Methodist Church to provide a six-week summer literacy camp for 36 at-risk children in our community. The Pilot Lions Club will provide finances, volunteers, and meals so these children can have quality instruction, books, and nutrition. This partnership is organic because the clubhouse and the school are neighbors, most of the Lions graduated from Pilot School, and half the membership attend Fairview UMC. Also, the Lions Club already sponsors a Christmas party for at-risk children where they receive food, clothing, and toys. This Christmas, the children will also receive books.
