Live-Love-Learn and Leave a Legacy DG Carolyn Sprinkle

When you read this article, I will be in Las Vegas in training for and being installed as the District Governor of MD31-I for the next 12 months. The exciting part of this journey is that I love the work we do as Lions. Lions in North Carolina began in 1922. The census for the 1922-23 Lions year was 11 clubs and 525 members. The anxious part of the journey is the legacy of the District Governors who have served before me, one of which was Louis Day (Rocky Mount-Old District C). He organized 38 clubs during the club year 1949-50 and became the first and only District Governor in North Carolina at that time to have 100 clubs in a district. In that Lions year, MD 31 had 11,263 members and 250 clubs. The prediction for the 2017-2018 Lions year unfortunately will be 6,200 members and 280 clubs.

My point is this, volunteerism has declined and continues to decline nationally. In 2003, the reported percentage of the American population who served as volunteers was 28.8%. In 2015, that percentage had dropped to 24.9%. We all know this trend. We all know how it affects those in need. In North Carolina, 1.3 million people are reported as disabled and another 1.2 million are impacted in some way by their needs.

So here is our challenge. We must ask for help – not new members – but others like us who are passionate about helping others. I'm not talking about Generation Y, but Generation X and Baby Boomers. The combined number of these two groups accounts for 82% of the population (2015 census) in North Carolina. Those of us in that 82% do not classify ourselves as senior citizens. We were and are looking for organizations dedicated to missions and that place a high premium on folks who love working with people and helping others. They, like all of us, need to feel valued and useful. They are not going to be enticed by opportunities just to stay busy. We are going to have to provide work for them that captures their imaginations, uses their skills and training and offers them opportunities for leadership and ownership.






