#### HURRICANE FLORENCE RELIEF

LCI has provided a \$100,000 grant - a great example of our contributions to international coming back home to North Carolina!

Those attending the USA/Canada Leadership Forum donated \$7000.

Lexington Downtown Lions Club donated \$750 to Pastor's Pantry, a nonprofit food pantry with no religious affiliation that targets senior hunger. Their main focus is seniors (age 60-plus) in financial stress. They provide groceries once per month, and also provide emergency food to individuals of all ages. Pastor's Pantry currently helps more than 700 individuals on average per month in nearly 500 senior households throughout Davidson County. The food is offered at no cost to the recipient.

#### Building Teams Through Leadership A USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum Experience

If you remember back to July in the first newsletter article I wrote as 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice District Governor, I mentioned that I would keep you posted on my journey as a Lion in this new position. My journey has begun, and I want to share part of my journey with you.

Last week, Lion Gayle (my wife) and I attended the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum for the first time. The theme for the forum was "Building Teams Through Leadership." We had a wonderful time meeting Lions from across the USA as well as Canada, sharing Lions stories with them and probably learning more from them than they learned from us.

Another highlight of the Forum was attending several of the 85+ seminars that were offered. We attended seminars such as "Membership Models for the Future, The Power of Storytelling, How to Attract and Keep Great Lions, Why Service Clubs are Dying and How to Fix Them, Enticing Millennials to be Lions," and others. The seminars offered opportunities to improve leadership skills as well as gain knowledge related to Lionism.

The Forum's featured speakers at meal events were excellent as well. We heard from our International President and three other speakers whose messages focused on leading and inspiring teams, strategies to respond rather than to react to new realities, the importance of building strong leaders and teams, and helping team members understand the impact each member makes regardless of their position.

It was also announced during the closing banquet that Lions International had approved sending \$100,000 to the area hit by Hurricane Florence for relief. In addition, over \$7,000 was collected during the banquet for relief. This is another example of how Lions help those in need.

If you've never been to a USA/Canada Leadership Forum, you might want to consider attending one. The 2019 Forum will be in Spokane, Washington, on September 19 - 21. Our own PDG Paul Bledsoe will be the general chairperson for this Forum.

Maria Julian and Elizabeth Curley from Appalachian Regional Health Department provided a program on opioid use at the Sept. 4 meeting of the **West Jefferson Lions Club.** Emphasis was on the indications and effects of opioid use and statistics about the opioid epidemic. Some of the indications of opioid overdose/poisoning are changes in the size of the pupils of the eyes, relaxed muscles "nodding out" (neck muscles relax so head may roll or go back) scratching of itchy skin, slurred speech and being "out of it." Signs of opioid overdose are unconsciousness, lack of responsive to noise, awake but unable to talk, **and** other noticeable signs. Naloxone is an immediate response drug for overdose reversal. The expert advice is to recognize the signs and learn how to best deal with the case if you have contact with someone exhibiting the symptoms of opioid overdose. The statistics of use show opioid use is among all age groups from middle school to the elderly. A discussion was held about future treatments as well as the efforts to stem the increased use of opioids.

We continue to look for options as to how we may have a backup vehicle to pull the MSU. Because as with any vehicle, unexpected repairs do happen and repairs must be made, which can leave us without the ability to meet our screening obligations. So, if you know someone that you feel might be of assistance, please let me know.

I am truly excited for the opportunity to get back out on the roads of North Carolina and help the Lions Clubs serve in their communities! With your continued support we have the opportunity to help so many people across the state. We have had many folks come through the MSU in the past year, some with signs of glaucoma, diabetic retinopathy and some with signs of intraocular melanoma. 
