

What a Difference a Month Makes

Join Lions! Make a Difference! - DG Jimmy Myers

Greetings Fellow Lions,

Back in February at the State Council and Board meeting, I had broached the possibility that we need an alternative plan in the event that President Choi might not be able to attend the April N.C. State Convention due to the Coronavirus causing flight restrictions. I was told he had written a letter which I could not find on my computer that this virus was not going to stop him. Now the entire state convention has been cancelled, and the International Convention has been postponed.*

This pandemic, which means a disease prevalent throughout the world, has intervened in all of our lives. Since I am a trained historian, I did some research on a pandemic that my grandparents lived through in 1918 at the height of World War I. In January 1918, a doctor in Kansas reported to the US Public Health Service an increase in flu activity. On March 11, 1918, a cook at Fort Riley, Kansas came down with the H1N1 flu. By noon, 100 soldiers were sick. By the summer, the flu was all over the world. In Philadelphia, 759 people died in one day. The death toll was estimated from a low of 17 million to a high of 100 million. The 1918 pandemic caused lower respiratory (the lungs) infections leading to a higher death rate similar to COVID-19. 26,277 American soldiers officially died of the flu.

The brother of the Rev. O.C. Loy, one of my mentors in Methodist ministry, died from the flu pandemic. It was the deadliest battle the American service personnel faced in World War I. The flu outlasted the war before subsiding in 1919.

This current pandemic has changed all of our schedules. I have had to reschedule my visits to the Clubs due to restaurants being closed. Your safety is most important. Most of our members are in the danger range of 65+. I have put out an ambitious schedule subject to whether or not you are meeting. I realize that there is a good possibility the restaurants will not be open. If I have to cancel and cannot reschedule before my year is up, I intend to visit you in the future just to say, "Hello, thank you for what you are doing." If you do cancel your meetings, remember to keep in touch with your clubs through email, especially those prospective members you are working with to become Lions.

As we celebrate Easter, let's be reminded that Easter reminds us of the hope that's in a new beginning. As Lions, we are reminded that "Where there's a need there's a Lion." Be on the lookout for needs we can help with such as delivering food to a neighbor, or simply calling to see how someone is doing.

March is the last month for our food drive contest. Keep a record of how much the food weighs you have donated to a local food bank. Report it to your club secretary, and have him report it to the District Secretary who will compile the weight. Happy Easter to all, and may our Heavenly Father bring good health to His world.

1st VDG Donald Cobb — How Do We Be Lions During These Times?

We find ourselves in trying times unlike most of us have ever experienced. We're told to stay at least six feet from one another, not to meet in groups of any size, and to stay home unless we have to go to the grocery store, get medicine, or do something essential. All of us are trying to stay away from others so we don't come in contact with the coronavirus because that is the best way to keep healthy.

But we're Lions, Lions who want to meet with one another, and Lions who want to serve our fellow man. How can we possibly be Lions at a time like this?

The good news is, WE CAN STILL BE LIONS! We just need to find a creative way to continue the work we do in our communities. We just need to find a different way to do those things that make us Lions!

Now, I suppose you're expecting me to tell you how we can continue to be Lions at a time like this. Well, I guess you're going to be disappointed because I do not have all the answers as to how we can continue to be Lions. I have to admit that I have been feeling somewhat lost with everything that is going on around us. But I have been thinking and I have done a little work trying to figure out how we can do things.

As I write this, I have recently participated in a Lions webinar entitled "COVID-19: How do we serve? How do we meet? How do we engage new leaders?" The webinar was hosted by PID Jerome Thompson who is working with the GAT at the national level. While it was quickly apparent that no one has all the answers as to how we can operate, it was apparent that a lot of Lions are working to come up with answers and they are going to continue to work. In fact, three subcommittees were formed to generate ideas and individuals were given an opportunity to sign up to work on these committees. Another webinar will be held on March 31st to share the ideas that have been generated.

While no one had all the answers during this webinar, individual Lions did share things that they were doing and I'd like to share some with you. First of all, how can our clubs meet? One idea is to do a conference call with club members and have your meeting by telephone, computer, or both. How can you do this? There is a resource and website called "freeconferencecall.com" that can be used to make both conference calls as well as video calls. While I have not used freeconferencecall.com, I have gone to the website and it appears you can set up an account and schedule your conference call for a particular time. There is no charge for using this service; however, you can make a contribution if you like. If this is like most of these programs, you simply schedule your call and then send your members the appropriate information as to how to log into the call.

Another way to communicate with club members is to communicate by email. Simply send an email to all club members periodically to stay in touch and conduct some business. Another option is to use the free email service "mailchimp" found at www.mailchimp.com, and send group emails to those on your mailing list.

How can Lions serve during this time? Some ideas presented were to offer to deliver groceries, medicines, other items to individuals in the community. A few Lions clubs were serving as a drop off point for their backpack feeding program or even delivering backpacks. One club passed out pieces of red and green construction paper to those 65 or older in their community. Individuals who were doing okay simply put the green construction paper in their window or if they needed something, they put the red construction paper in a window. Lions would then drive by their house and call them if they saw the red paper in a window. Another club was planning to start a community garden for the summer to give individuals a chance to raise their own vegetables. It was stressed that only individuals who were under 65 should be delivering items or having contact with individuals.

These are just a few of the ideas generated during the webinar. The second webinar that will be held on March 31st should offer many more ideas of how we can meet and serve during this time. If you are interested in participating in this webinar, let me know and I'll make sure you get the information on how and when to join!

Should we isolate ourselves during these challenging times? Absolutely not! We simply have to be creative in looking for ways to stay connected with our club members and to serve our communities. Let's put our minds together and do our work as Lions!

Every year we are challenged to meet goals from our local, District, State, and International Lions family. Hopefully most clubs will help our District Governor Jimmy Myers meet these goals. Our state convention is just around the corner, April 24-26; hope to see you there!

Please continue to raise money for this project that is our life blood for many of the activities that go on yearly. Our District normally raises more money than all other districts in the state. Have you sent in your club money yet so we can reach our goal?

2020 International Convention Cancelled

Dear Lions,

The Board of Directors has voted to cancel the 2020 Lions International Convention due to concerns about the coronavirus (COVID-19). This means that the next International Convention will be held in 2021 in Montreal, Canada.

After evaluating a variety of different options including moving the convention to a different venue or postponing the convention to a later date, the Board of Directors voted to cancel the 2020 convention. This decision was made with the health and safety of our Lions, staff and vendors in mind. Canceling the International Convention for 2020 impacts international officer continuity and candidate elections. After review of the International Constitution and By-Laws, this impact is outlined below:

Executive officers and international directors will continue in their respective positions until the 2021 convention in Montreal. All candidate elections for these positions shall comply with the provisions of the International Constitution and By-Laws for election at the convention in Montreal.

An international director from the areas of Africa and Australia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, Indonesia and the Islands of the South Pacific is permitted only in even-numbered years. As a result, no director from Africa or Australia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, Indonesia and the Islands of the South Pacific would be eligible for election until the 2022 convention.

Barring any district election complaints, district governors, first vice district governors and second vice district governors elected during a convention of their respective districts will be accepted by Lions International. The International Board of Directors intends to authorize commencement of the DG terms beginning July 1, 2020.

We are disappointed that we will not be able to move forward with this international event, but we are optimistic that with each new day there is hope, and as Lions we will continue to find new ways to put our kindness in action while safely serving our communities.

This newsletter has been the hardest one I have ever had to write for any organization I have ever been affiliated with in my life. I would like to be excited to tell all of you in District I that we have already raised over \$106,500 for this year's Brighter Visions campaign. This should be something to really get excited and brag about. Unfortunately, we are in the most trying times anyone in the world has probably ever encountered since we cannot fix it right now. I believe in my heart we will. However what bothers me is that the pandemic has frozen many of us. We have put our heads in the sand and said we would wait out the storm. Many clubs, including mine, have shut down and are going to wait until we can fix everything. WE ARE LIONS... WE SERVE... Now is not the time for us to shut down... the world needs us now more than ever... and we need to find new ways to serve and still be safe. God knows with many of us shut in, we should have the time.

I am excited to say there are Lions from across the country who are mobilizing and serving. Let me tell you who they are...

Thanks to Donald Cobb, next year's District Governor, Donald and I were invited to sit in on a video conference sponsored by the GLOBAL ACTION TEAM of LIONS INTERNATIONAL earlier this past week. (I did not know LIONS had a GLOBAL ACTION TEAM) After participating in the Conference, I was asked to join a subcommittee formed of 17 LIONS from across the country and Canada. We have been charged with coming up with new and creative ways to help clubs stay active. This morning the committee met through a ZOOM Video Conference for the first time. Our meeting lasted an hour and a half. We have some great Lions all across this great country, and they want to serve. I have been asked to co-chair this sub-committee with Lion Dahleen Kendler from Reno, Nevada who knows more about technology and video conferencing meetings than any Lion I have ever met. The committee has members from all over the US and Canada. In fact one of our Canadian members knew me from the VIP fishing tournament. They all wanted to hear about Camp Dogwood and Brighter Visions. One of the reasons I was asked to co-chair is because I am a ZOOM host myself. We use ZOOM extensively for training and meetings within my company and church.

One of the first things we learned today, which did not surprise me, is that most Lions Clubs across the US and Canada have older members and most have never used video conferencing. I know a couple of clubs in our District have done it or are doing it. Most have not. I would like to call our District to action and let us be one of the leaders in LIONS on video conferencing of club meetings and activities. The few clubs that are doing this across the country have gotten some amazing results. A club in Arizona has grown to 32 members in the past year and most are in their 20's. Many of them admit they would probably not have joined if they had to go to dinner meetings. Some clubs have done well fundraising through video conferencing and many clubs have had better attendance at their meetings. I would be happy to volunteer my time and lead a training session for any club presidents, club officers, district leaders, clubs, and any other interested LIONS who want it... This should be the time for action from LIONS clubs while we weather the current pandemic. Along the way, just maybe, we might figure out more creative ways to SERVE and even raise more money for BRIGHTER VISIONS and our other fundraising projects.

Let's keep talking, and let's GET CREATIVE.

The mental and emotional toll of COVID-19 is as much a threat to public health as the virus itself. Therefore it is important to keep engaged.

I. We may have to practice physical distancing but not social isolation thanks to technology. We have countless ways to stay close to loved ones while keeping a healthy distance. Check in over Skype or FaceTime, call friends, or respond to emails you've been meaning to get around to for weeks (or months). The more connected we stay, the better off we are.

II. Keeping our minds and bodies busy is key to overall wellness, especially in times of crisis. Make a point to engage in things that bring you joy. Go for a walk by yourself or with a pet, read, try new recipes, resurrect an old hobby that somehow got lost in rush of life or learn a new language. There are also hundreds of apps dedicated to yoga, mindful meditation, home-workouts, and activities to help you stay calm and present.

III. Limit news consumption. It's important to get accurate, up-to-date information, but binge reading or watching can negatively impact well-being. It is OK to unplug for awhile.

IV. Create a new routine to fit your new normal. In this time of uncertainty, structure can alleviate anxiety and give a sense of control over our lives. Try to stick to a schedule, with a consistent sleeping and wakeup time each day and having regular and nutritious meals. Set a few manageable daily goals for yourself.

V. Seek help. It's important to reach out if overwhelmed. This can mean talking to friends, family or someone you trust. It can also mean engaging a mental health professional. It may not be feasible to see in person but there are expanding telehealth services.

There is no question the coming weeks and months will be difficult. No one can say how long this pandemic will last or when we will get back to normal. But if we take good care of ourselves and each other, we can emerge from this crisis more resilient — and just maybe, mentally stronger than before.
