## 1st VDG Donald Cobb — More Ways to Serve and Get Involved

We still find ourselves at home for the most part, looking for ways we can serve as Lions. Many of our clubs are meeting by using Zoom, GoToMeeting, or some other virtual meeting platform. Our clubs have been conducting officer elections by email as well. Many of our members have been emailing or calling other club members to check on them. Some of our Tail Twisters have been busy sending out items that bring a smile to our faces.

No matter what you have been doing, as Lions, you probably have wanted to do more. In last month's newsletter, we talked about some of the ways our clubs could continue to meet as well as shared some ideas as to ways we could serve during this time. I want to take this opportunity to share a few more ways we as Lions can serve.

Many of our local food pantries are running low on food items. Now would be an excellent time to conduct a food drive to help stock pantry shelves. One club in our district parked a pickup truck outside a grocery store and asked people to purchase extra food items and place them in the back of the truck when they left the store. These items were then delivered to the local food pantry. Food pantries may also need extra volunteers to stock shelves, and Lions could help with stocking or packing food items.

Lions might also help others in their community by shopping for and delivering groceries or other items for those who cannot get out or who are at a greater risk. Local shelters or agencies that provide assistance to others might need additional support that Lions could offer. In other areas, Meals on Wheels might need additional volunteers to deliver food items. Remember, collaboration with other agencies helps everyone in the community and increases impact and reduces duplication of effort.

While you might not think of it as serving, you might want to consider your local restaurant or other businesses that support Lions activities in your community. If you still like to order from a restaurant and do take out, consider ordering from restaurants in your community that provide support for your regular Lions activities. At a time when their business is probably down, it would be a good gesture to support them.

While we've been talking about ways to serve our community, there are ways we can serve our Lions organization as well. First, make sure you have held your officer elections for the coming year. You can do this by having people vote by email, or you can call individuals to get their vote. Once your elections are held, be sure to enter your officers in MyLCI. We will soon be conducting officer training and will need to know who your club officers are in order to issue an invitation to them. More information regarding officer training may be found in this newsletter as well. Also, be sure to watch for more ways to be involved in district activities as we go throughout the year.

These are just a few ideas as to how we can serve others as Lions. There are many more ways to serve, just use your imagination to keep your club members involved.


As soon as our agenda is complete for the convention, a registration form will be sent to all clubs with meeting times included.

## **LCIF** Response to COVID-19

## **LCIF Grants**

LCIF is giving priority consideration to support regions with extreme rates of confirmed COVID-19 cases. The focus will be on addressing those needs that exist within local medical and emergency management systems that are coordinating efforts with the World Health Organization (WHO) and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDD) guidelines.

For consideration, applications need to:

- 1. Follow the Emergency (EMR) grant criteria of having at least 100+ people infected (confirmed cases) in the immediate area/district.
- 2. US\$10,000 maximum grant amount.
- 3. Funds available only to address active and immediate cases; not future outbreaks. Disaster Preparedness grants are excluded.
- 4. Funds should be used for Lions to work with local medical and emergency management services that are addressing the outbreak. This could be for sourcing medical supplies, quarantine-related expenses, etc. for those infected.
- 5. Funds may not cover personal expenses for those infected or quarantined.
- 6. Another option is to consider Multiple District level grants, as appropriate, for areas with a significant number of cases (5,000+) over several districts.
- 7. All requests will be considered on a case-by-case basis.




## 2020 Camping Season - Cancelled

The essay below was written by Mason Jeffers, one of Mint Hill Lions Club's scholarship winners for this year. Mason is the son of Scott Jeffers, the incoming club president. His essay was selected by an independent committee. Mason has been a big help to the club and was very deserving of this award. (Submitted by Lion Bill Mathers).

I can remember being around seven years old when my Dad first took me to a Lions club meeting. Being that young, I was more interested in the food and possibly dessert than the content of the meeting itself. I remember walking into Jimmies with my dad, wondering who all these people where. Little did I know, these were the people who I would grow to appreciate over the next decade. As I grew older, the achievements and accomplishments I heard talked about in the meeting became more and more impressive, the more I understood. Eventually, at sixteen, I was fortunate enough to meet firsthand someone who had been helped by the Lions several years prior. I sat in my school's reception room, speaking to a student about my age. His name was Keenan and he was blind. He spoke of a group of men, "heroes" as he referred to them, who helped him live his life once more. I talked to him more about these people who helped him, and eventually I came to the realization that it was the Lions Club who had helped send him to Camp Dogwood and given him back a piece of his life that he otherwise would still live without. It was at that moment that I realized how much of an influence the Lions really had. I watched Keenan move, talk, and laugh and realized that if the Lions could help him be a normal person again, that there would be little in life the Lions couldn't help with.

A truly unique experience the Lions and I have had, came in the wake of my aunt's passing. It was sudden, unexpected, and ruled an accident by the State of South Carolina. The Mint Hill Lions didn't know her, and they didn't know her family, but that didn't stop them from making a difference. They saw a community in need, and they acted on it. They provided the three children and husband she left behind with financial support and hosted a barbeque in her name to raise awareness and build support. Upon seeing what all the Lions had done for my family, I realized that they really meant what they said. Seeing people help other people who they know nothing about was eye opening and it showed me that the Lions Club really just wants the best for the community.

Thinking back, I can remember being woken up far before the sun had risen and being told that I was going to help my dad setup for the Lions Club race. Tired and still half asleep I stumbled out of bed, got dressed, and left for Town Hall to "help". Later in life, I realized that I wasn't there to help. A ten-year-old couldn't lift a table, or several chairs. In fact, it was the best that I could do to stay out of the way. Instead, the point of it all was to see men, good men, helping the community and giving happiness and joy to the people who attended their events. The Lions have always acted as an example for me. An example of how to help a community in many ways, and how to have fun while doing it. Eventually after years of helping to set up and take down tents, chairs, and tables I was given the opportunity to really help the Lions club in an obtuse, but fluffy way. The annual 5K was coming up, and the Leonidas suit was up for grabs. As if clockwork, one early morning my dad woke me up again, this time I was 17 instead of 7, he told me he needed a favor, and it wouldn't take long. I nodded my head and hopped in the car. Little did I know that in the next hour my life would be changed in a very unique way. We arrived at a local festival in Mint Hill and familiar faces were everywhere. That's when my dad took the Leonidas suit out of the car and smiled at me. He said through a slightly sarcastic smile, "It won't be for long, but I need you to wear this so we can get some pictures". To be honest, I wasn't excited at first, but I've never been a person to refuse the opportunity to clown around. I put on the suit and began hugging and talking to anybody that would have anything to do with a six-foot-tall lion. I waved to kids, blew kisses to parents, and hugged anybody brave enough to get close. Eventually, we ran into a small little boy. His name was Caleb and at first, I thought he was just small for his age, but later was told he was what one would call a "little person". He ran up to me yelling "Lion!" and laughing as hard as he could. It seemed he couldn't have been much older than five or six. Seeing the joy, a dumb lion costume brought him, his parents, and the people around us showed me what the true purpose of the Lions was. To serve. And while most people think of serving as carrying a rifle into battle, riding a helicopter to save lives, or carrying handcuffs and keeping the peace, sometimes to serve your community, you have to dress up like a lion and give out hugs to little people. After that day I knew my fate as being Leonidas was sealed and I'd rather it be no other way. Personally, not being a very exuberant person, being able to put on a costume and be "over-the-top" and the center of attention was amazing, and I would do it again in a heartbeat. Being a part of the Lion's club has shown me many things about community and perseverance. It's taught me how to be brutally honest, how to be myself in all situations, how to be proud of myself for my accomplishments, and how to laugh when everything is going wrong. So, thank you, Mint Hill Lions, for not only showing me what the fulfillment of communitarian responsibility looks like, but for showing me how to enjoy it.


