Volunteers Creating a Future — DG Donald Cobb

How Much Are You Worth?

You may have noticed that I continue to talk about Lions being volunteers. That's what we as Lions do, volunteer our time as we serve our visually impaired individuals, our communities, our district, and our world. Lions have about 1.4 million members around the world who volunteer their time and the impacts they have in their communities are great. But when you get right down to it, how much are we as volunteers really worth?

There are several organizations that calculate the value of volunteer time, usually on an annual basis. I found one, the Independent Sector, that just updated their statistics on the value of volunteers as of July 2020. They have calculated the value of volunteer time as being \$27.20 per hour. That means that for each hour you give Lions as a volunteer, you are contributing \$27.20 as a volunteer to society. We have 1,070 Lions Club members in our District as of today. When all the Lions in our District volunteer one hour to our Lions projects, the value of that hour is \$29,104. Think of all the hours you volunteer as a Lion. That makes a pretty impressive dollar contribution to our society especially when you multiply that by 1,070 members. But don't stop there, think what our value would be if we had 1,200, 1,500, or even 2,000 members in our district?

Let's go even further. If there are 1.4 million Lions across the world, what is the value of an hour of Lions volunteer time? According to my calculator, when each Lion around the world volunteers one hour, that would be equal \$38,080,000 using the U.S. value of a volunteer hour. Quite an impressive figure (even though I realize the value of volunteer time around the world is not equal to the value of a volunteer hour in the U.S.) still, that illustrates the contributions Lions make in every community in which they serve.

Now, we have 1,070 Lions in our district and each hour our 1,070 members volunteer is worth \$29,104. If we increased our membership, the value we contribute to society would increase as well as our efforts in our communities. Is that an incentive to increase our membership? You bet it is!

You might say, we can't increase our membership now. We are in the middle of a COVID-19 crisis. Many of our clubs aren't meeting. How can we expect to get new members at a time like this when we can't do what we usually do as Lions? Guess what? We are still increasing our membership, even at a time like this! Lion Michelle Gregory, our District Cabinet Secretary, sent me an email the other day that said we have had 10 new members join Lions in our District in the past month. Ten new members at a time like this. Who would have thought such a thing would happen? I believe it is because people have seen what Lions have done at a time like this. You continue to serve your communities, maybe not in the way you would have served in "normal" times, but you continue to volunteer your time and make a difference. Others see what you are doing, and they want to be a part of it. As Lions, you are creating a future in your communities. Others are seeing it and they want to be a part of it. Let's continue to serve our communities, ask others to join us, and make a difference.

While in Zone Chairperson training, each participant was asked to contact each of the clubs in their Zone and ask a couple of questions. Here is a summary of their reports.

What did you learn about your zone that most surprised you?

Clubs are trying to find ways to hold fund-raisers, meet and provide service.

Older Lions are afraid to attend meetings and activities.

What is going well in your Zone?

Projects that require minimal personal contact. Examples are pen-pal-projects, blood drives, food drives, mailing packages to our military overseas, and care packages to VAVS.

What opportunities exist for you to offer support to the clubs?

We must get and keep members active, discover, and create opportunities for Service, Membership, and Leadership.

As we are faced with these issues, Lions International encourages us to participate in an effort to rejuvenate our district with new clubs, revitalize clubs with new members, and re-motivate our members with new fellowships and exciting service to our communities. This effort will require changes in how we meet and serve.

Our district has begun this process and need Lion leaders to join the effort by being involved in the North American Membership Initiative (NAMI). The NAMI process contains four phases; Build a Team, Build a Vision, Build a Plan, and Build Success. Our district is moving into the Build a Team phase as we prepare to Build a Vision.
