Volunteers Creating a Future—District Governor Donald Cobb Club Activities in the Spring

March is here, spring is around the corner, and it's time to start making plans for the coming Lions year. With many of our clubs still not meeting, we are still facing challenges on how to do things. But one thing we've found out during this year is that there is more than one way to get things done! As you know, March is the time when we typically start the process of electing new club officers for the coming year. I've had a question asked as to how we can do that if a club is not meeting. Well, there are several ways to do that and some of our clubs actually used some of these ways to elect officers for the current year.

Even if your club is not meeting, you can still follow the basic process for electing officers. A nominating committee should be appointed to develop a slate of officers for the coming year, and yes, you can ask the same individuals to serve another year. The nominating committee can meet by phone, Zoom, or by email to develop a slate of officers. The nominating committee can then submit their slate of officers to the president who can then email it to members for their information and to see if there is an additional nomination from the club. You can then hold your election by sending a ballot to each club member by email and ask them to vote and return their email to the president for counting. The president should then communicate to the club the results of the election. Remember, the election process is not complete until the results have been entered into the LCI website.

If your club is meeting by Zoom or in person, it's still time to start your election process as well so don't forget to get started. Doing everything in a timely manner insures you get off to a good start in the new year.

Speaking of elections, when are we going to hold elections for our district officers? Our district convention will be held on Saturday, March 20th, beginning at 10 am. We will be meeting by Zoom and elections will be held during the district cabinet meeting. Information regarding club delegates has already been sent to clubs and I would encourage you to return your delegate forms as soon as possible. Our convention planning committee led by 1st VDG Wayne Kennerly has been working hard to plan the convention as well as develop a process for our officer elections. In addition to our cabinet meeting and elections, we will also be joined by International Director Justin Faber who is from Michigan. While our convention will be different from our normal conventions, we will still have an opportunity to conduct our business, hear words from one of our International Directors, and get to visit with one another by Zoom.

It goes without saying it has been a difficult year for Lions across our district, state, nation and world. But, we've adapted, served our communities, and made do. Our service has continued across the district, perhaps not like we would have wanted, but we have continued to serve in many ways and I commend you for what you have done. You have continued to be "Volunteers Creating a Future" for others and I thank you for what you have done and continue to do. Be well and stay safe!

North Carolina Lions Eyeglass Recycling Program

According to The World Health Organization, 153 million people have uncorrected refractive errors (near-sightedness, far-sightedness or astigmatism). Most of these vision impairments are quickly diagnosed and easy to treat with corrective lenses.

Still, millions of people in developing nations are pushed deeper into poverty

simply because they don't have glasses. They can't learn, because reading is difficult. They can't work to the best of their ability, because they can't see clearly. For children, clear vision means a better education, healthier development, and a better quality of life. For adults, clear vision means greater employment opportunity and economic strength. For seniors clear vision means less dependence on others.

North Carolina Lions collect over 170,000 pairs of eyeglasses each year to address the need for glasses, making eyeglass recycling one of our most popular activities.

Certification of Delegates for Spring Convention via Zoom
Conference Call March 20, 2021

Please note that our certification process will be different this year since our convention will be held via Zoom conference call.

Each chartered Lions Club in District 31-I in good standing is entitled to one (1) voting delegate and one (1) alternate for each ten (10) members or major fraction thereof, as shown by the record of the International Office on the first day of February, 2021.

*****NOTE THAT A CLUB IN GOOD STANDING has paid District and International dues.** Delinquent dues may be paid and good standing acquired up to fifteen (15) days prior to the close of credential certification, so the deadline is February 28, 2021. Voting delegates and alternates must have been a member of the club for a year and a day.

Please note that District Governors and Past District Governors in good standing are full delegates in their own right with voting rights and are not to be counted in your club's delegate count. Their club, however, must be in Good Standing. They do need to be listed on your delegates form (with the designation DG or PDG) to be certified.

Delegates and alternates at the Convention on March 20th will be certified by the District Secretary by March 15, 2021, and will be considered registered at that time. If a delegate is unable to participate in the Zoom convention, he/she must notify the District Secretary by email prior to March 15, 2021, and also provide the name of the alternate who will be voting in his/her place.

Please remember to submit your delegate certification form to the District Cabinet Secretary, Lion Michelle Gregory, no later than Monday March 15th. Club Secretaries received an email from Lion Michelle on or about Feb 1st. If you did not, please contact her immediately for the information you need to certify delegates for your club. The certification process is a little bit different this year, since our cabinet meeting and the election will be held via a zoom meeting.

CLUB NEWS

Concord Lions recently became partners in a Cabarrus County program which seeks to reduce homelessness in Concord. There are an estimated 555 Million homeless persons in the United States. This represents a rate of approximately 17 people experiencing homelessness per every 10,000 people in the general population. This information indicates that the homelessness problem exists in every Lions Club community.

Concord Lions have pledged to the group to be a conduit to provide visual assistance where needed. Many of the individuals, whether enrolled in school or seeking employment, may need assistance to ensure that their vision is suited for success.

Concord Lions plan to offer vision screening for participants using their SPOT Vision Screening program once the social distancing requirements are lifted. Meanwhile, ten individuals have been given appointments with local doctors. Should they receive a prescription for corrective lens, the club will assist in the purchase of glasses.

Concord Lions have stepped up to hopefully assist these individuals back on the road to self-sufficiency. We may never know how this act of kindness may affect these individuals. Experience tells us that good vision is paramount to success in school and one's work environment.

Concord Lions are making a difference in their lives. Where there is a NEED, there is a LION!

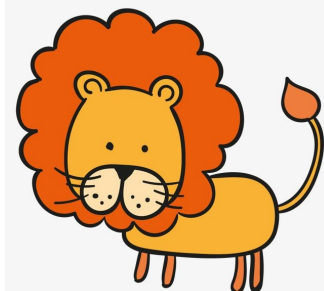

International Convention Will Be Virtual

Due to the continuing concerns about COVID-19, the LCI Board of Directors have voted to move the 2021 International Convention to a totally virtual convention. This decision was made with the health and safety of Lions, staff and vendors in mind as limiting international travel and large gatherings is key to global containment strategies.

Here are some important details about the 2021 virtual convention:

- **Everyone's invited** – The 2021 convention will be a virtual event that's open to all Lions and Leos around the world.
- **Registration fees** – The registration fee will be US \$50 until March 31, then US \$75 beginning April 1. The registration fee for Leos will be US \$30 regardless of date. Convention is currently scheduled for June 25-29. Additional event and registration details will be provided soon.
- **Current registrants** – Lions who are currently registered for convention will receive an email soon with more information about their registration options.
- **Elections** – Executive officer and international director elections will be conducted electronically and voting procedures will be forthcoming.

Convention updates – Check the convention website LCICon for convention updates and details as they become available.

Resolution Approved by LCI Board of Directors

To support the incredible men and women serving with us during the COVID-19 pandemic, the International Board of Directors unanimously passed the following resolution to help our clubs.

- **Charter and entrance fees waiver** – We have waived all charter and entrance fees from January 1 through June 30, 2021.
- **Flexible payments** – No clubs in good standing on December 31, 2020 will be suspended or canceled through June 30, 2021 for late payment of dues. Full payment is required to be received before June 30, 2021 to avoid suspension or cancellation.
- ***Please note that clubs placed on financial suspension on December 31, 2020 will remain on suspension until the full balance is paid. Those clubs will still need to address their outstanding dues or make arrangements for repayment with the Accounts Receivable Department at Lions Clubs International to avoid cancellation scheduled for March 1, 2021.***
